My Advice To You Is

All jurisdictions have different requirements for becoming a lawyer. Learn those requirements at the earliest possible stage. Furthermore, you should become a member of the bar in both Canada and the U.S.

If your goal is to be a lawyer, more than a law degree is required. Book V will teach exactly what is involved in taking the further step of being admitted to the bar: becoming a lawyer in Canada, the United States or England.
